### TOK 3.0

- O Beginning with the Class of 2021
- O Past structure: 3 semesters, twice a week, 0 or 7<sup>th</sup> period
- O NEW structure:
  - X required meetings junior year to introduce TOK,
    CAS and the EE
  - Year long class senior year that meets alternating days
- The IB requires that we teach TOK over the course of two years

## Class of 2020 - Extended Essay

#### Before they leave for summer

- Students will have met their supervisor 3 times.
- Student will have a focused research question.
- Student will have list of sources and a plan to complete working draft.

#### Expectations

- Students should spend 20 hours on the EE in the summer. (5 half days)
- Students will be provided with rubrics, links to sample essays plus scanned chapters on writing the EE from the EE textbook.

### Class of 2020 - Extended Essay

#### September

- Students will meet with their supervisor in September to discuss what they have written so far and complete a mandatory reflective statement. They will be asked to bring a copy of what they have written so far, with research highlighted
- Students will submit a minimum 3200 word draft by October 28th, including a works cited page and parenthetical citations or footnotes.
- They must submit this draft in order to be allowed to register for exams as a diploma candidate.

### Class of 2020 - CAS

- Creativity, Action and Service should be ½ complete by June 3<sup>rd</sup>.
  - 50 hours of more of CAS DONE
  - 50 or more hours of CAS PROPOSED
  - CAS Project Approved

## Class of 2021 Updates

- Extended Essay and CAS will be run through x required TOK meetings junior year.
- O At the first required TOK meeting in September the CAS Coordinator will get students started on CAS.
- O Students are expected to be involved in CAS on a weekly basis during the school year. There is no need for students to worry about CAS over the summer after grade 10.

## Class of 2021: ManageBac

- Online reporting system that will be used to track CAS and EE
  - O Students document CAS experiences
  - A team of IB Booster Parents approves projects and gives feedback on reflections
- O Students will be given account logon information in early September.

### Summer Plans: CAS

### Class of 2021

We teach the CAS process in TOK. CAS activities are designed around learning goals and need to allow for personal growth and reflection. Students are expected to be involved in CAS on a weekly basis during the school year.

CAS Experiences can be Creative, Active, or Service related. Students should carry out one CAS experience per semester in each strand.

Students will also complete a CAS project sometime during junior or the first half of senior year. A CAS project fits into one or more strands, is collaborative, and lasts for at least a month.

### Class of 2020

Students are expected to end the year with CAS half "done". This means that they should have completed reflections for at least 50 hours of Creativity, Action and Service by June.

Summer is an excellent time to launch service projects.

Supervisors will not be available to approve activities. Students should proceed assuming the activities will be approved.

## Summer Plans: EE

#### Class of 2021

Read. Read. Read.

Students will be asked to choose an IB subject, then choose a topic within that subject. If they think they might want to write a science essay they may want to pick up *Scientific American* or a book by Neil deGrasse Tyson. If history is of interest, they could pick up a biography or a history book.

Read, read, and then read some more.

#### Class of 2020

Students should schedule out research time. We strongly encourage students to utilize the UW Libraries.

Mr. McQueen and Ms. Monaghan will schedule some days during the summer where we will set up camp at Third Place Books to help students work on their papers. We will also be available to meet at Suzzallo library. We will use ManageBac to announce these days.
